- 1. Nomination Deadline** – Applications and nomination materials must be received by **November 30**. Nominations will consist of two copies of a candidate’s application and the requested supporting materials, a nomination sheet ranking the candidates, and a completed summary sheet for each candidate.

- 2. Eligibility** - Eligible students need to be currently enrolled and have completed at least one year of undergraduate study by the time their program begins. Participant must also have at least one term of study remaining when they complete the program, so please verify with all candidates that if selected, upon completion of their UGRAD program (December 2010 for some, May/June 2011 for most) they will still have courses to complete at their home institution before they graduate. Participants should also be **24 years or younger** at the time of application.

- 3. English score requirements** - Nominations should include unofficial English test scores (TOEFL institutional, TOEIC, etc.) and all candidates – principals and alternates – must take an official TOEFL. Posts should assist nominated students in taking an institutional TOEFL or equivalent test so scores can be submitted with the nominations by the November 30 deadline. Copies of score reports or other documentation authenticating the scores should be included with the application/nominations.

- 4. Fields of Study in the U.S. system:** Students that majors such as Medicine, Law, TESL and Pharmaceutical Studies are typically offered as graduate level degrees at U.S. Universities. At the undergraduate level, TESL is usually offered as a minor with the Education Major, Medicine is Pre-Medicine’ and Law is Pre-Law. World Learning will work with the schools to determine the best placements for the students in order to take the courses they want, however, it is important that they understand this about the U.S. system so that they are not disappointed.
